REFUSE

Trash pick-up for December and January will be on the regular days, Thursdays.

WATER BILLING

10% late charge if not paid on or before the 30th of the month. Account balances are due in full by the 10th of the month on bills having delinquent balances or service will be discontinued. Nonpayment, there shall be required to be paid a penalty in the amount twice the customer's average monthly bill before turning on and reinstating water service after the same has been shut off for nonpayment.

BUILDING PERMITS

CITY CODE Article 2;Section 4-201.

It shall be unlawful for any person to hereafter erect or cause to be erected within the city any building or structure of any kind or enlarge or add to the outside dimension thereof, or relocate any building or structure already erected or which may hereafter be erected or remodel any building or structure within the city without a building permit being first obtained therefor from the city clerk. The application for such permit shall be made and the permit obtained before work is commenced upon any building or structure or the foundation thereof, or before the removal of any building begins. (July 16, 1987)

HEALTH AND WELFARE

City Code Article 2A;Section 8-2A08.

It shall be unlawful for any person to allow to exist on any residential, commercial or industrial premises, conditions which are injurious to the health, safety or general welfare of the residents of the community or conditions which are detrimental to adjoining property, the neighborhood or the city. (July 16, 1987)

ANIMAL CONTROL

City Code Article 1 Section 2-116

It shall be unlawful for any person to willfully allow any animal or fowl under his or her control to be or to run at large within the city. Any animal or fowl found at large shall be impounded as provided in section 2-117 or 2-206 (dogs). (July 16, 1987)

Section 2-206.

(c) The owner of any dog impounded for running at large without the tag required by section 2-202 shall, for the first offense, pay a fine of \$20 plus the board bill; for the second offense and subsequent offenses a fine of \$50, plus the board bill;

(d) For the first offense of an animal running at large with a tag as required by section 2-202, the owner or harbinger claiming any animal, shall, for the first offense, pay a fine of \$15 plus the board bill. For a second and all subsequent offenses, the owner or harbinger shall pay a fine of \$50 plus the cost of the board bill. (Ord. 383, Sec. 1; Code July 16, 1987)

NEWS FROM THE LIBRARY...

The Whitewater Memorial Library Board of Directors would like to take this opportunity to thank all of you who support your local library by using the services offered. We are very proud of our facility and are working hard to take every opportunity to improve and add to the programs and materials available. Because the library works on very limited funds, it is all that more important that we take care of what we have. Although the rules of the library are few in number, they are important. We ask that when using the library, please keep these few things in mind.

1. Patrons 5 and older may check out books. (Parents must sign for children under 5).
2. Limit of 4 books per patron per visit; in addition 4 cassettes or records or combination of both).
3. Remember sun and water are the 2 greatest causes of damage to books and tapes.
4. Patrons will be charged for damages. This is necessary to replace materials that are destroyed due to carelessness.
5. Books and tapes/cassettes may be checked out for a period of 2 weeks.
6. Borrowers assume responsibility for materials checked out. Overdue charge is 5¢ per library day on each item, maximum overdue charge of \$2.00 per item. There is a minimum replacement charge for lost or damaged materials.

In addition to books, the library provides many other services including VHS movies available for check out, library loan service, 16mm films, patterns, travel films for senior citizens, newspapers, magazines, tax information, special services for the visually handicapped, a summer reading program for the youth and a pre-school story hour (Sept. to May).

We have a wonderful facility to be used and enjoyed by all....let's use it!

DISABLED VEHICLES

Section 93 of Article 13 of the Standard Traffic Ordinance states: "No person, firm or corporation shall park or store any dead, damaged, or disabled automobile or vehicle or farm machinery, trailer, or semitrailer of any kind, or parts of the same, or any junk automobiles, or vehicles or farm machinery or trailers or semitrailers, in the roadway of any highway, or between the property line or sidewalk and the curb line of any street.
