### Additional Phone Services Available

Attached you will find a copy of an ordinance passed by the City Council pertaining to new sewer rates. The Council also adopted the Uniform Public Offense Code and the Standard Traffic Ordinance for Kansas Cities.

ORDINANCE NO. 450

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER XV, ARTICLE III, SECTION 342 OF THE CODE FOR THE CITY OF WHITEWATER, KANSAS, AS ADOPTED BY ORDINANCE NO. 438 OF THE SAID CITY, AND ESTABLISHING NEW SEWER USAGE RATES FOR THE CITY OF WHITEWATER, KANSAS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF WHITEWATER, KANSAS:

Section 1. That Chapter XV, Article III, Section 342 of the Code of the City of Whitewater, Kansas, as adopted by Ordinance No. 438 of said City is hereby amended and changed to read as follows:

SAME, RATES. The user charge rates established in this article apply to all users, regardless of their location, to the City's treatment works.

- (a) Residential User: A minimum charge of \$10.50 for the first 5,000 gallons or any part thereof; an additional \$2.10 for each additional 1,000 gallons per month.
- (b) Other Major Users:
  - (1) Class II (Wheat State Nursing Home) - \$2.25 per 1,000 gallons;
  - (2) Class III (School)-\$2.15 per 1,000 gallons;
  - (3) Class IV (Locker Plant) - \$4.90 per 1,000 gallons.
- (c) Outside City Limits: The sewer user charges for residents outside the City limits shall be 150 percent of those established for users within the City.
- (d) Nonresident connection to the sewer system shall be determined on a case-by-case basis by the governing body.
- (e) The City will notify each user at least annually, in conjunction with a regular bill, of the rate being charged for operation, maintenance including replacement of the treatment works.
- (f) The City will review the user charge system at least every two years, and revise user charge rates as necessary to ensure that the system generates adequate revenues to pay the costs of operation and maintenance including replacement costs among users and user classes.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its adoption and publication in The El Dorado Times, the official newspaper of said City.

### New City Park. . .

On April 1, 1989, Glen Summervill, Chairman of the Board of the Bank of Whitewater, presented Mayor Pete Klassen with a deed conveying land to the City for a neighborhood park. The park will be located between Pine & Willow streets in the Centerview Addition. Any person or organizations interested in donating their time for landscaping and installing equipment, please contact the Clerk's office.

### Animal Clinic. . .

Vaccinations for dogs and cats will be given at the animal clinic scheduled for April 15th from 8 to 11 a.m. at the Fire Station. Pat Regier, D.V.M. advised that all dogs should receive the DHLP/P (dystemper, hepatitis, leptospirosis, parainfluenza & parvovirus) and rabies shots once a year. The cost for DHLP/P is \$12.00 & rabies is \$8.00.

All cats should receive a FVRCP (panleukopenia, rhinotracheitis & chlamydia) and rabies shots once a year. The FVRCP is \$10.00 & rabies shot is \$8.00.

City dog and cat tags will be available for \$4.00 each. If your animal has been spayed or neutered, the tags are \$2.00 with a certificate of proof.

### Animal Control (just a reminder). . .

With summer approaching and more children playing outside, please be reminded of the City code for animal control.

City Code Article 1; Section 2-116

It shall be unlawful for any person to willfully allow any animal or fowl under his or her control to be or to run at large within the City. Any animal or fowl found at large shall be impounded as provided in Section 2-117 or 2-206 (dogs).

(c) The owner of any dog impounded for running at large without the tag required by Section 2-202 shall, for the first offense, pay a fine of \$20 plus the board bill; for the second offense and subsequent offenses a fine of \$50, plus the board bill;

(d) For the first offense of an animal running at large with a tag as required by Section 2-202, the owner or harbinger claiming any animal, shall, for the first offense, pay a fine of \$15 plus the board bill. For a second and all subsequent offenses, the owner or harbinger shall pay a fine of \$50 plus the cost of the board bill. (Ord. 383, Sec. 1; Code July, 1987).

### **Annual Spring Clean Up. . .**

The Whitewater C.J.'s are sponsoring a "Spring Clean Up" on Saturday, April 29th. They request that trash be separated as burnables and non-burnables. All trash should be on the curb by 9 a.m. Non-burnables will be picked up first. For information or special needs call:

### **City Dump. . .**

The Kansas State Department of Health and Environment regulates and inspects the use of city tree and brush burn sites. The only items allowed at the dump are trees, brush, and clean lumber. No asphalt shingles, tarpaper, tires, trash, garbage, etc. are allowed. Non-compliance with these regulations will result in the closing of the dump.

Any resident requesting the use of the dump key can pick up the key at the City Clerk's office during office hours. If the key is needed during the weekend, arrangements will be made for your convenience. The City dump will be open all day April 29th, during the C.J.'s clean up, for those who want to take brush and other burnables to the dump.

While everyone is busy with the clean up day, please be reminded that using the proper sized containers for weekly trash pickup will eliminate the trash problems we're presently experiencing. Residential containers should have a capacity of not more than 32 gallons not weighing more than 75 pounds when full. They should be of galvanized metal or other non-rusting material of substantial construction. Each container should have a tight fitting lid and should be leak-proof and fly-tight. All containers should have handles of suitable construction to permit lifting. Plastic bags not less than 1.5 mills in thickness may be substituted for residential containers. Plastic bags, when used, shall be securely closed. Baskets, boxes and noncomplying refuse or garbage cans or containers may be considered disposable refuse and may be removed by the authorized collector if they are of a proper size and otherwise acceptable for collection. The collector may leave

uncollected such items if they are larger than the described size or are unacceptable for collection by him or her. All garbage should be drained of all liquids before being placed in bags or containers.

Merchants with excessive amounts of refuse should use bulk containers. Bulk containers should have a capacity of one or two cubic yards and should be equipped with appurtenances for attaching mechanical lifting devices which are compatible with the collection equipment being used. Containers should be constructed of durable rust and corrosion resistant material which is easy to clean. All containers should be equipped with tight fitting lids or doors to prevent entrance of insects or rodents. Doors and lids should be constructed and maintained so they can be easily opened. Containers should be watertight, leakproof and weather proof construction.

The Centennial celebration is fast approaching, and the City Council would like to urge every resident and merchant to assess the condition of their premises. Let's present a clean and friendly community!

#### **Vacation Time. . .**

Effective March 13, 1989, if any City resident that is planning to be gone from their home for more than thirty (30) consecutive days will provide written notice to the City Clerk's office stating date they are leaving and the date they return, the resident will not be charged for trash. The water and sewer charges will be the minimum charge. If they choose to have the water turned off, the \$15.00 connection fee charge will apply. The written notices must be received in the Clerk's office **prior** to leaving the City.

#### **Tornado Siren. . .**

The tornado warning signal for Whitewater is a three minute continuous blast of the fire siren. The siren is tested the first Monday of each month.

#### **Park & Recreation Commission. . .**

The Whitewater Park Board would like to thank all coaches, team members, and parents for their support during Biddy Basketball season.

Plans are being made for mens and womens softball this year. More information will be provided soon.

The Walnut Valley League has changed the T-ball aged teams to an "instructional" league rather than competitive.

Applications and information for T-ball and girls and boys baseball will be available at school and the City Building on April 10th.

**Fishing & Hunting Licenses. . .**

Fishing and hunting licenses can be purchased at the City Clerk's office between 9 a.m. & 4 p.m., Monday through Friday. The fees are: fishing \$14.00; hunting \$11.00; combination fishing/hunting \$24.00.

Any person born on or after July 1, 1957, must successfully complete the Kansas Hunter Safety Course before he/she can buy a hunting license. Hunting safety certificates must be displayed when purchasing a hunting license.

**Whitewater Cemetery Notice. . .**

Memorial Day will be observed May 29, 1989, with American Legion services at 10 a.m. According to the Rules and Regulations of the Whitewater Cemetery --"Temporary decorations shall be allowed for three (3) days before observed Memorial Day and ten (10) days after observed Memorial Day." Decorations left on graves after the ten (10) days will be discarded so the mowers can maintain the cemetery grounds.
