Animal Clinic

The Whitewater vaccination clinic will be held April 6, 1991, from 9 - 11 a.m. at the fire station. Dogs and cats will be vaccinated for rabies and distemper (combination shot) by Dr. Patrick Regier. The charges at the vaccination clinic will be rabies - one year \$6, three years \$8; DHLP/P (for dogs \$12), and FVRCP for cats \$8. If your pet was vaccinated at last years clinic, it can receive a three year rabies shot. If your pet was vaccinated at Dr. Regier's clinic less than a year ago, please bring the certificate or call 799-2740 to verify the vaccination prior to the clinic April 6th. No three year rabie shots will be given without proof of the first rabies shot less than a year ago.

From the Kansas State University Cooperative Extension Service:

In these troubled and trying times, perhaps we could all learn from

"A LESSON FROM THE GEESE"

1. As each bird flaps its wings, it creates an uplift for the bird following. By flying in a V formation, the whole flock adds 71%

flying range than if each bird flew alone.

People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going quicker and easier because they are traveling on the thrust of one another.

2. Whenever a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to fly alone, and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the "lifting power" of the bird immediately in front.

If we have as much sense as a goose, we will stay in formation with those who are headed where we want to go.

3. When the lead goose gets tired, it rotates back into formation and another goose flies at the point position.

It pays to take turns doing the hard tasks, and sharing leadership - with people as with geese, interdependent with each other.

4. The geese in formation honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed.

We need to make sure our honking from behind is encouraging -- not something less helpful.

5. When a goose gets sick or wounded or shot down, two geese drop out of formation and follow him down to help and protect him. They stay with him until he is either able to fly again or dies. They then launch out on their own with another formation or to catch up with their flock.

If we have as much sense as the geese, we'll stand by each other!

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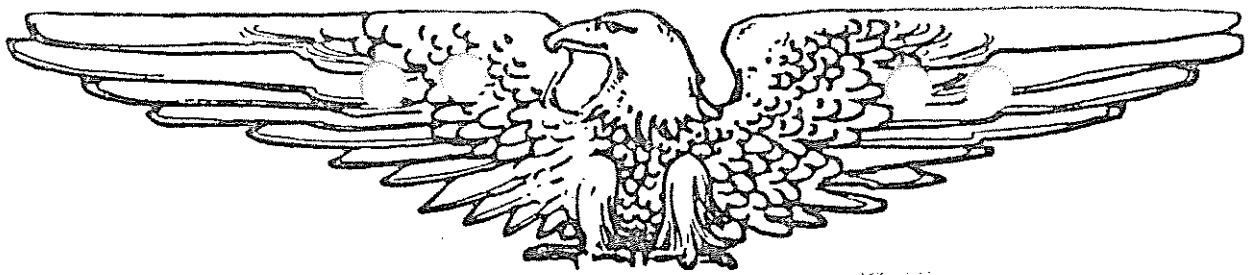

SALUTE TO VETERANS

The communities of Elbing, Furley, Palmyra, Potwin and Whitewater are pooling their resources and talents to honor their friends and neighbors who have worn the uniform of their country. The celebration, entitled "SALUTE TO VETERANS" will be held July 4th in Whitewater. This celebration is a "welcome home" and a "thank you" to the Desert Storm veterans who served during the Persian Gulf Crisis, belated honors to Korean and Vietnam veterans who deserved a celebration, and a recognition to all veterans who have served their country.

The celebration will start with a 4 p.m. parade, a barbeque about 6 p.m., Honors to Veterans about 8 p.m., followed by entertainment. The conclusion will be fireworks after dark. There is an open invitation to groups or individuals to enter floats, novelties or anything else to make a parade interesting. All veterans are invited to be in the parade. Parade information should be directed to Mr. Don Whiteside, Potwin, 752-3261, or the Whitewater American Legion.

Special attractions for the celebration will be the attendance of 5th District Congressman Dick Nichols. Congressman Nichols is a veteran and represents us in the United States House of Representatives. There will be a "mini" Avenue of Flags at the ball diamond. To show your patriotism, a small flag will be given to persons attending the celebration.

A budget of \$6,000 has been established. To raise money, "Salute to Veterans" buttons are being sold. The button entitles each individual to the barbeque dinner and admission to the fireworks. Families with children may purchase a family package for

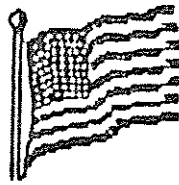

HEALTH CARE FACILITY REPORT

The Remington Area Health Council has received a 6-page prepared "Initial Health Plan" for the Remington Area from the Bauer Group who conducted the Town Meetings and Task Force Meetings on April 19th and 20th, 1991. Copies of this report will be sent to the members of the task forces and be available for anyone who is interested in this information.

It is recommended that this area

pursue local and foundation funds to develop a detailed health plan. It is also recommended that we begin the process of setting up a non-profit corporation to manage the new system.

The Council will be meeting in the near future to discuss the recommendations as set forth by the Bauer Group.

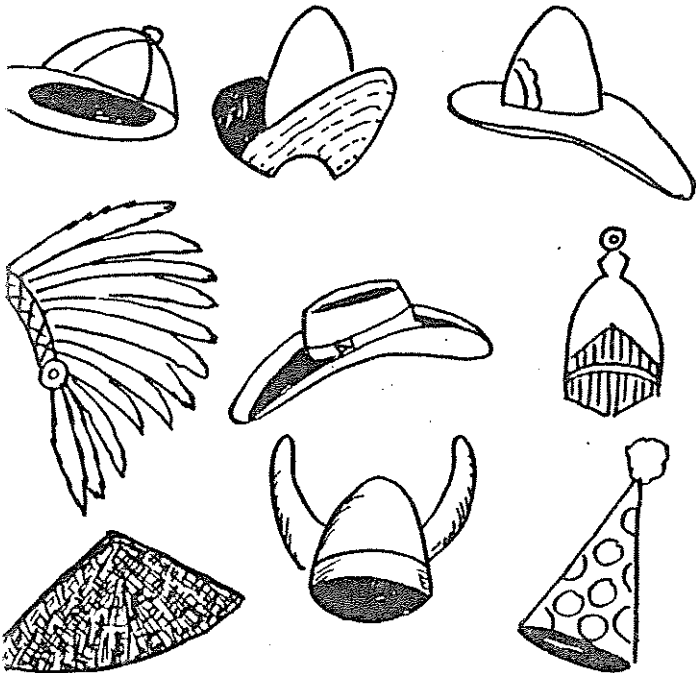

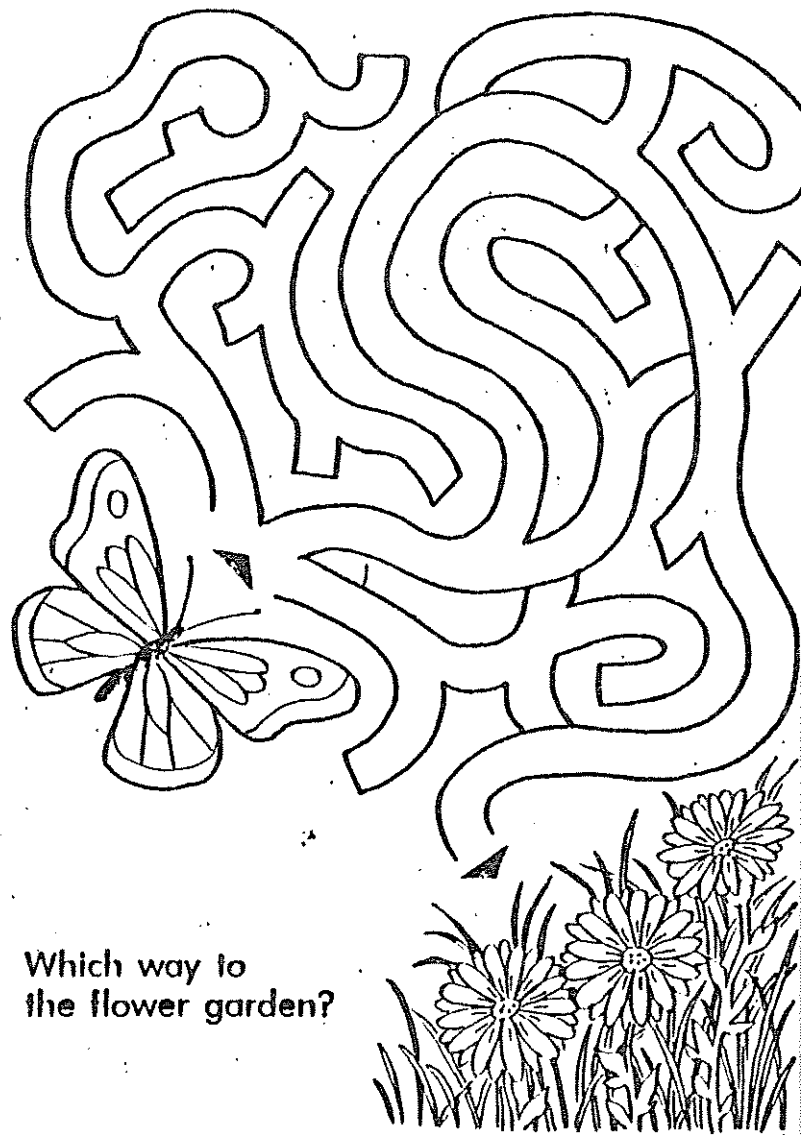
