The vote was unanimous.

Betty Whitaker suggested we make yard signs for the winners of the lighting contest. It was suggested we use the 1994 Holiday Christmas Tour logo to follow through with our event. Betty was to talk with Jim Klenke about running copies of our signs and Norman Smalley and Sid Ulmer said stakes would not be a problem to come up with.

Three Pride members volunteered to act as judges for the City of Potwin's lighting contest. Judging will occur Saturday, December 17th, starting at 6:30 p.m. All those entering the contest must have lights on at this time.

Sid Ulmer presented the November treasurer's report. Beginning balance of 00.00, monthly receipts of \$170.00, expenses of 27.56, month-end balance of \$142.44. The treasurer's report was accepted as presented. Sid stated he had recieved the necessary IRS forms for a non-profit organization. Sid made a motion, seconded by Jodi Silbernagle that we procure a post office box for the Pride organization. Luella Cooper volunteered to take care of obtaining the post office box.

It was decided the Pride organization would sponsor another pitch tournament Saturday, January 28th at the Legion. Details will be printed in the January City newsletter.

A presentation was made and discussion conducted on Pride's participation in supporting a grant program to distribute monies for the raising of old buildings in towns across Kansas. The board is too costly for any organization to handle the purchase alone. Together, purchase of a community board at a minimal cost to each organization could be achieved. This was left for further discussion upon receipt of information from the Boy Scouts.

A motion for adjournment was made. The meeting was adjourned.

The death of Robert T. Adams of Whitewater, made a void in the Central Kansas American Legion Organization. Mr. Adams died while visiting his children in the Omaha, Nebraska area the day after Thanksgiving. At the time of his death, he held the office of Post Commander for the Wm. P. Phillips Post No. 65 in Whitewater. He was also the County Commander for the Butler County Council which is comprised of Posts and Units from: Andover, Augusta, Douglas, El Dorado and Whitewater. He was the chaplain of the Fifth District which is composed of the counties of Butler, Harvey, McPherson, Sedgwick and Sumner.

One of Bob's goals was to see his Post and County Council reach quota or goal in membership for 1995. On the day of his funeral, his Post in Whitewater met the quota as established by the Department of Kansas. He would have been happy to brag about this accomplishment.

The Whitewater Post Vice Commander, Jim L. Lutes, automatically assumed the position of Commander. The Butler County Vice Commander Gaylord Whiteside of El Dorado will assume the position of County Commander. The vacancy of Chaplain of the Fifth District will come by appointment at the next Fifth district Executive meeting.

Mr. Adams was also a member of the Peabody V. F. W.

Mr. Adams earned his eligibility for the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars by serving in the U. S. Army during World War II. He earned a battle star when his army unit participated in the invasion and liberation of the Phillipine Islands.

One medical call was made in Pleasant Township. The remaining 6 calls were in Butler county. These calls breakdown as follows: 5 medical assistance in the City of Whitewater, and 1 medical assistance in Milton Township.

There was 1 regularly scheduled training meeting held. The November 16 meeting was attended by 10 members. Training centered around air pack use and search and rescue in structures. Also held in November was an officers meeting. One officer also attended an Officer's Workshop held in Hesston on November 13 & 14.

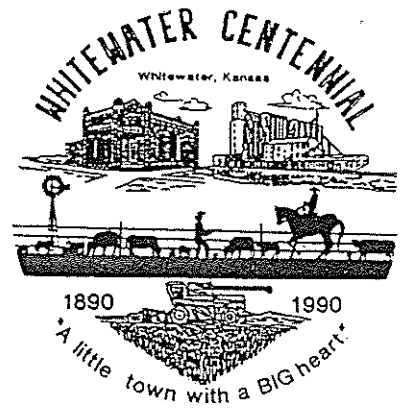
Bingo is played on the first & third Saturdays of each month at 7:00 p.m. The public is invited to come play.

A breakdown of the calls shows 1 was in Richland Township in Harvey County. This call was for medical assistance. The other call was mutual aid with Newton Fire on a grass fire. The remaining 7 calls were in Butler County and included 2 auto accidents in Fairmont Township, 4 medical assistance in the City of Whitewater, and 1 mutual aid with Potwin on a car fire.

There were 2 regularly scheduled training meetings held. The October 5 meeting was attended by 7 members. Training centered around a tour of the Farmers Grain Coop and a review of the pre-fire plan and location of various materials. The October 19 meeting was attended by 11 members. Training included a tour of Remington High School and a review of the pre-fire plan and location of various departments and materials.

BUTLER COUNTY SANITARY LANDFILL

1995 FEE POLICIES

1. Secured Loads - Maintain current policy of a double charge for unsecured loads of waste entering the landfill.
2. Minimum Vehicle Fee - Maintain a flat vehicle charge for cars or for small pickup loads of Household Waste or Burnable Materials from an individual customer.
3. Fee by Count - Maintain a per count charge on tires and white goods.
4. Fee by Weight - All load sizes or waste types not covered under the Minimum Vehicle Fee or under the Fee by Count or for any loads hauled by a contract hauler shall be charged on the basis of weight rounded to the nearest 20 pounds.
5. Special Waste - All waste requiring special handling or KDHE authorization shall be assessed a double charge for disposal costs plus a surcharge for paperwork processing.
6. Out-of-County Waste - Maintain the current policy of not excepting any out-of-county waste.

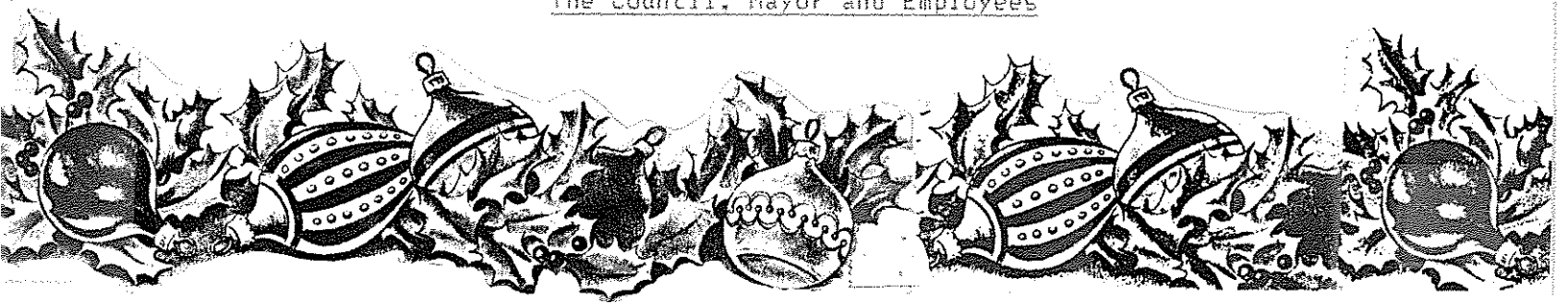

PUBLIC NOTICE
OF
TOTAL COLIFORM MAXIMUM CONTAMINANT LEVEL VIOLATION

In accordance with the National Primary Drinking Water Regulations and Kansas Administrative Regulation 28-15-15a, the City of Whitewater public water supply system is hereby making public notice of the violation of drinking water microbiological standards for total coliforms in its distribution system during September 1994.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) sets drinking water standards and has determined, based on information provided by the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and other scientific and medical information, that the presence of total coliforms is a possible health concern. Total coliforms are common in the environment and are generally not harmful themselves. The presence of these bacteria in drinking water, however, generally is a result of a problem with water treatment or the pipes which distribute the water, and indicates that the water may be contaminated with organisms that can cause disease. Disease symptoms may include diarrhea, cramps, nausea, and possible jaundice, and any associated headaches and fatigue. These symptoms however, are not just associated with disease-causing organisms in drinking water, but may also be caused by a number of factors other than your drinking water. EPA has set an enforceable drinking water standard for total coliforms to reduce the risk of these adverse health effects. Under this standard, no more than five percent of the samples collected during a month can contain these bacteria, except that systems collecting fewer than 40 samples a month that have one total coliform-positive sample per month are not violating the standard. Drinking water which meets this standard is usually not associated with a health risk from disease-causing bacteria and should be considered safe.

The Whitewater Public Water Supply System is continuing to test the water and is working with KDHE to identify the source of the problem and to return the water supply system to compliance. FRAZIER FAMILY

Doug & Cynn Frazier of Whitewater are parents of 4 children, 3 of which have a rare, congenital heart condition known as hypertrophic cardiomyopathy. Cynn & her mother both have a mild case, which was unknowingly passed on. Jennifer, age 14, also has a mild case. Aimee, 11, suffers from a very severe case and received a pacemaker last March to try to slow the disease's progression, hoping to avoid the necessity of a heart transplant. Megan, age 10, has a less severe case than Aimee, but also received a pacemaker in Nov. 1993. According to the doctors who treat the girls at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Maryland, the pacemaker has slowed the progression in Aimee and increased blood flow to her heart. The girls will be required to visit the Institute every six months for the next five years for evaluation & treatment. The Frazier family has experienced a financial strain even though the treatment at NIH is free. They must pay for transportation, meals and lodging. They also have the cost of medication, frequent doctors appointments locally and insurance deductibles. A fund has been set up at the Bank of Whitewater, AIMEE FRAZIER FUND, to help with expenses.

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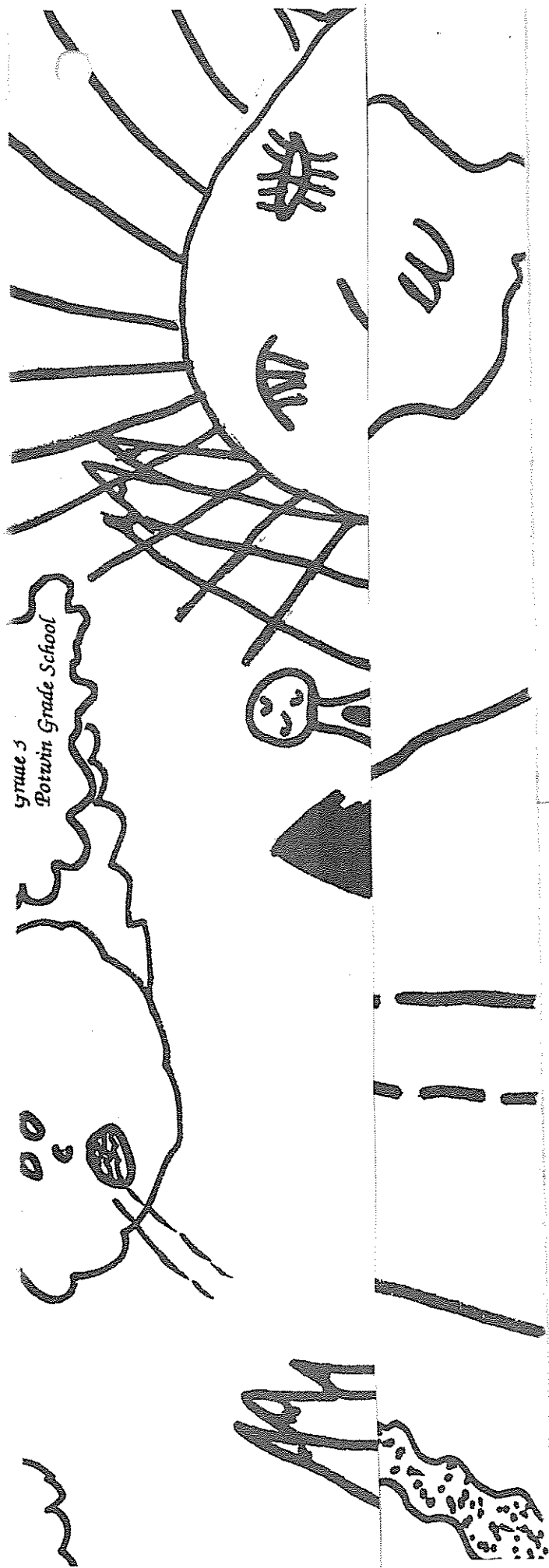
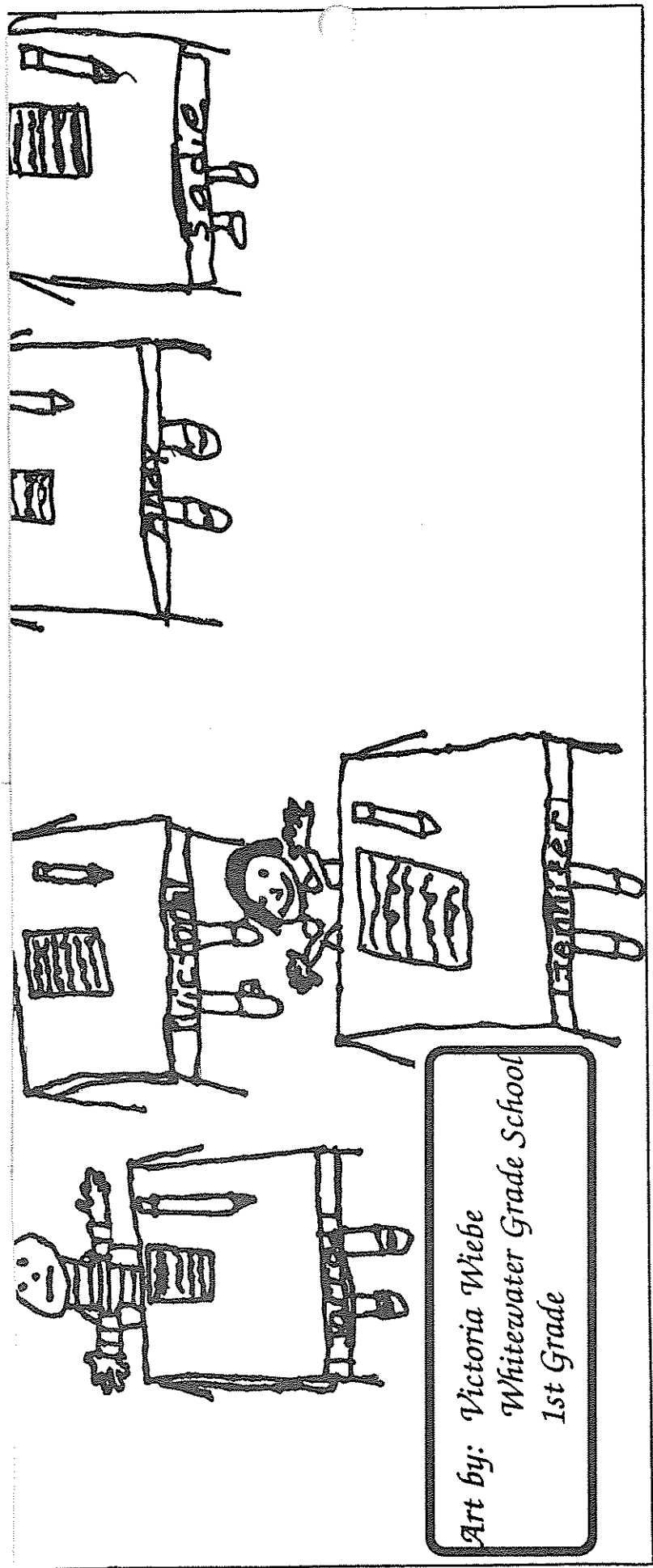
