Animal Control

With summer approaching and children playing outside, please be reminded of the City Code for animal control.

City Code Article 1; Section 2-116. It shall be unlawful for any person to willfully allow any animal or fowl under his or her control to be or to run at large within the City. Any animal or fowl found at large shall be impounded as provided in Section 2-117 or 2-206 (dogs).

(c) The owner of any dog impounded for running at large without the tag required by Section 2-202 shall, for the first offense, pay a fine of \$20, court costs of \$10 plus the board bill; for the second offense and subsequent offenses a fine of \$50, court costs of \$10 plus the board bill;

(d) For the first offense of an animal running at large with a tag as required by Section 2-202, the owner or harborer claiming any animal, shall for the first offense pay a fine of \$15 plus the board bill. For a second and all subsequent offenses, the owner or harborer shall pay a fine of \$50 plus the cost of the board bill. (Ord. 383)

City dog tags are available at the City Building during normal work hours for \$4.00 each. If your animal has been spayed or neutered, the tags are \$2.00 with a certificate of proof. It is also necessary to present a certificate indicating that the dog has received a rabies shot in order to receive the tag. Dog tags expire May 31st, so purchase your 1995-1996 tag prior to that date !!

The American Legion

The Legionnaires of the Whitewater American Legion and members of the Whitewater American Legion Auxiliary have plans that all veterans in the community cemeteries are remembered and honored.

On Friday, May 26th, the Legion will put Grave Marker Flags on ALL known veterans graves in 16 community cemeteries. The Auxiliary will put small white crosses on graves in several cemeteries, in time they hope to get every grave with a cross. Each cross has four poppies representing the four chaplains who gave their life in World War II. The Chapel of the Four Chaplains is a major project of The American Legion Auxiliary.

The Whitewater Legion and Auxiliary have the distinction of serving more cemeteries by a Post and Unit than any other veterans organization in the United States, maybe even the world. There are 18 cemeteries in the community but only 16 have veterans buried in them. The servicing of the 16 cemeteries does not mean they put out more grave flags than some posts. There are cemeteries in larger cities that have more veterans buried in one cemetery than the combined total of the 16 cemeteries. It is an honor to service so many different cemeteries in Butler, Harvey and Sedgwick Counties.

On Saturday afternoon, the Legionnaires will gather to load poles for the Avenues of Flags. The poles will be put on a trailer and stored until early Monday morning. Unfortunately, if the poles were distributed to the cemeteries, they could be stolen. This has happened.

On Saturday afternoon and evening, the Whitewater Legion Building will be a meeting place for Whitewater High School graduates. Their reunion is Saturday, May 27th in Whitewater. The Legion Building provides a place to remember and socialize.

Monday morning, May 29th, its up at the crack of dawn. The Avenue of Flags poles will be distributed to their holders and the flags put up. This involves the Mc Gill Cemetery south of Potwin and the Whitewater Cemetery. Legionnaires, Boy Scouts and friends will be at the cemeteries at 6:00 a.m. to put up the flags. At around 7:00 a.m., the groups from both cemeteries gather at The Legion Building for a biscuit and gravy breakfast with orange juice, coffee and fellowship. The breakfast is served by Whitewater's American Legion Auxiliary. At 10:00 a.m. the Whitewater Legionnaires will conduct their annual Memorial Day Service. The speaker for the service will be the Rev. Scott Martin, pastor of The Federated Church in Whitewater. The public is invited and encouraged to attend the service. At 11:00 a.m., a second Memorial Service will be held at the Mc Gill Cemetery south of Potwin. This will be a duplicate of the Whitewater Service. At 7:00 p.m. the Avenue of Flags will be retrieved. The flags will be folded in a military manner and prepared for storage. The pole will be picked up and then stored. The Grave Marker Flags will be retrieved Memorial Day evening or Monday. They too must be prepared for storage. If anyone knows of a veteran's grave that does not have a grave markers and flag, it would be appreciated if they would let the Legion Chaplain Jack Lockwood know or Rollan Eberhard, the post adjutant. Memorial Day Services have been conducted by the Whitewater American Legion since 1921, 75 years.

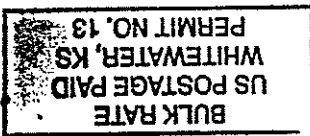

City Code Article 1; Section 2-116. It shall be unlawful for any person to willfully allow any animal or fowl under his or her control to be or to run at large within the City. Any animal or fowl found at large shall be impounded as provided in Section 2-117 or 2-206 (dogs).

(c) The owner of any dog impounded for running at large without the tag required by Section 2-202 shall, for the first offense, pay a fine of \$25, court costs of \$17 plus the board bill; for the second offense and subsequent offenses a fine and court costs to be set by the Municipal Court Judge plus the board bill;

(d) For the first offense of an animal running at large with a tag as required by Section 2-202, the owner or harbinger claiming any animal, shall for the first offense pay a fine of \$25, court costs of \$17 plus the board bill. For a second and all subsequent offenses, the owner or harbinger shall pay a fine and court costs to be set by the Municipal Court Judge plus the board bill.

THE AMERICAN LEGION

The Whitewater American Legion has had a lot of activity in the past weeks. In the latter part of April, Whitewater's Post was well represented at the American Legion's Fifth District Convention in El Dorado with 12 Legionnaires attending. The Post got an Honorable Mention for their Color Guard in the District Parade. The Post History Book took First Place, thanks to the hard work of Post Historian Norman Smalley. In mid May, four members and their wives went to the State Convention in Topeka. Again, the Whitewater History Book took first place, this time for the State of Kansas. Norman Smalley puts a lot of hard work and time to have such a good book.

The Whitewater Post has been honored by the County, District, State and National for having a All Time High in membership for 1995. The Legion Post Flag has a yellow honor ribbon on it.

Memorial Day meant a lot of hard work for the Legion and Auxiliary. There were 16 cemeteries to put up Veteran's Grave Marker Flags. 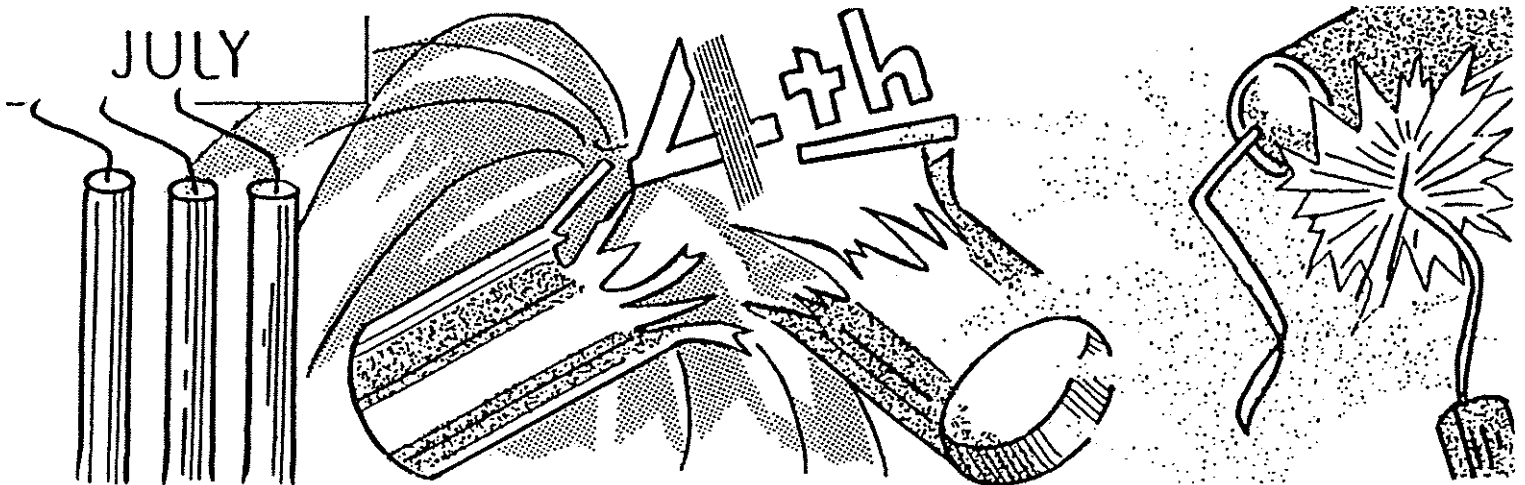

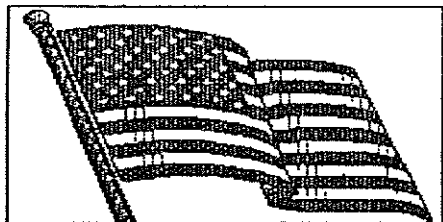

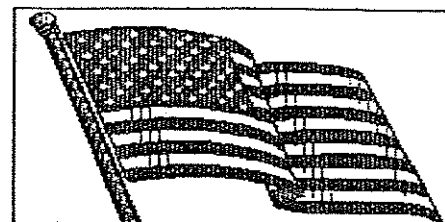
The young people have been earning their way through group projects like church dinners, a garage sale, calendar sales and slave days. In addition, they are raising half their fare on their own.

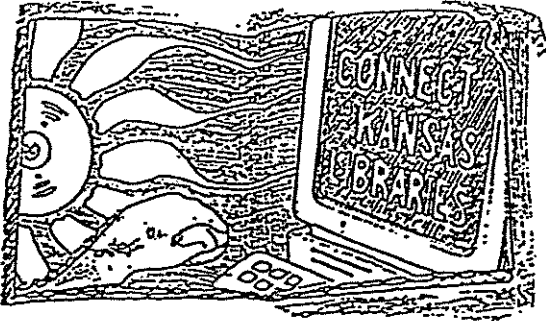
Updates for the standard traffic ordinance and public offense ordinance will be prepared by the city attorney.

NOTICE

Please be informed of the following ordinance in the City of Whitewater Code Book. The following ordinance will be enforced.

11-201 CURFEW; ESTABLISHED. It shall be unlawful for any child under the age of 18 years to wander, lounge, loaf, loiter or play in, about or upon any public street, alley, sidewalk, vacant lot, public place or other place normally accessible to the general public for public use, whether on foot or in a vehicle or by any other means, after the hour of 11:00 p.m. and before the hour of 6:00 a.m., unless accompanied by a parent, legal guardian, or other person exercising legal custody of such child. Such prohibition shall not apply to those children under the age of 18 years who are enroute by the most direct and accessible route between their homes and authorized places of employment, nor to those who are enroute by the most direct and accessible route from a place of employment, authorized entertainment, or authorized place of attendance to their residences. The term "authorized" as used in this section shall denote prior authorization by a parent, legal guardian, or other person exercising legal custody. (Ord. 353, Sec. 1)

11-202 SAME; PARENTS AND OTHERS. It shall be unlawful for any parent, legal guardian, or other person lawfully entitled to the care, custody and control of any child under the age of 18 years to suffer, permit or allow any such child to wander, lounge, loaf, loiter or play in, about or upon any public street, alley, sidewalk, vacant lot, public place or other place normally accessible to the general public for public use,

after the hour of 11:00 p.m. and before the hour of 6:00 a.m. unless accompanied by a parent, legal guardian, or other person lawfully entitled to the care, custody and control of such child. (Ord. 353, Sec. 2)

11-203 SAME; SUSPENSION OF CURFEW. The governing body on specific occasions, shall have the authority to suspend the curfew by official proclamation published in the official city newspaper. (Ord. 353, Sec. 3)

11-204 SAME; PENALTY. Any person violating any of the provisions of sections 11-201:204 shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$100 or by imprisonment not exceeding three months, or by both. (Ord. 353, Sec. 4)

ARTICLE I
NAME

Section 1 The name of this organization shall be Whitewater PRIDE Program, Inc.

ARTICLE II
OFFICE

Section 1 The principal office of the Corporation in the State of Kansas shall be located in the City of Whitewater, County of Butler.

ARTICLE III
PURPOSE

Section 1 Whitewater PRIDE, Inc. shall promote the community of Whitewater.

Section 2 Whitewater PRIDE, Inc. shall provide service to the community.

Section 3 Whitewater PRIDE, Inc. shall be a catalyst to coordinate activities and organizations in the community.

ARTICLE IV
MEMBERSHIP

Section 1 Shall consist of anyone residing in the Whitewater Area.

Section 2 No one shall be denied membership because of race, creed, religion, or physical or mental challenges.

ARTICLE V
MEETINGS

Section 1 The regular monthly meeting of Whitewater PRIDE Inc. shall be the first Monday of each month at 7:00 PM in the Whitewater Library unless otherwise designated.

Section 2 Special meetings may be called by a member of the executive board if members are notified either verbally or by mail.

ARTICLE VI OFFICERS

- Section 1 The officers shall consist of President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer.
- Section 2 Officers shall be elected by the attending members at the November meeting and will assume duties at that time.
- Section 3 Officers shall represent all residents of the Whitewater area as fairly as possible.

ARTICLE VII DUTIES

- Section 1 President-shall preside over all meetings and perform other duties as directed by the board.

In new business, we decided to have a gift exchange and collect food for the needy in December.

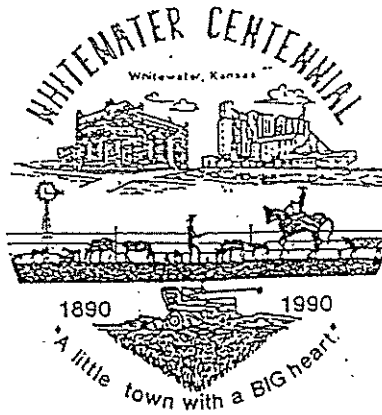

The Whitewater City Council met on November 13, 1995 at 7:30 p.m. Mayor Pat Ryan called the meeting to order. Members present were: Mike Slaymaker, Larry Wiebe, Virginia McCoy and Bill Reynolds. Robert Roth was absent.

Danna Castillo, local representative of Excel Telecommunications, Inc. made a presentation to the Council about the long distance service available through Excel. The Council asked Kay Grochowsky to research current long distance charges before they make a decision about changing service.

Ronnie Hill came before the Council with samples of three types that could be used at the Scout House. The best window with insulated glass would cost \$1569.61 for seven windows, installed. The next window with insulated glass would cost \$1118.60, installed. The third window to be used inside existing storm windows would cost \$385.00. The council voted to purchase the first window, at a cost of \$1569.61, installed.

Phillip Wickwire of the Butler County Sheriff's Department appeared before the Council as requested to explain how to set up a Neighborhood Watch here in Whitewater. The Sheriff's Department would provide literature and personnel to assist with the program. First, it will be necessary to conduct a survey to measure the interest within the community for such a program. A survey could be included in the December Newsletter.

The October 1995 Sheriff's report was received without comment.

The Animal Control report was received with no discussion.

The Utility delinquencies were discussed and Kay Grochowsky stated that delinquent notices were mailed today.

Expenditures were presented and approved. The Financial statement for October was received.

The November Court Docket was received without any discussion.

Jim Lutes presented the proposed ramp design for the American Legion Building. He stated that the first plan submitted was not approved by the ADA. Discussion was held about possible alternatives. The plan was then approved as submitted.

Wendell Campbell reported that the culvert on South Elm has been completed. He also reported that the generator at the lift station has been repaired. He stated that the new doors have been installed on the garage. The company still needs to replace one panel and remove the old doors.

Kay Grochowsky reported that Irvin Spratt installed the light in the supply closet in the office. The electrical outlet on the north side of the City Building was found to be working. She showed the Council the list of awards that will be presented in February, 1996.

A short discussion was held as to whether the City of Whitewater asks for bids on insurance needed by the City.

Virginia McCoy stated that the Caroling Event will be Sunday December 3rd. She asked each Council Member to furnish three dozen cookies for the refreshments.

A discussion was held about the licenses needed for the radios owned by the City.

The Council went into Executive Session from 9:10 p.m. until 9:30 p.m. to discuss personnel matters. After the session, the Council approved an increase of fifty cents per hour for Wendell Campbell and an increase of twenty-five cents per hour for Jason Roth, both to be effective January 1, 1996. A discussion of bonuses was held but no decision was reached.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:45 p.m.

The Whitewater City Council met on November 27, 1995 at 7:30 p.m. The meeting was called to order by Mayor Pat Ryan. Members present were: Mike Slaymaker, Larry Wiebe, Robert Roth, Virginia McCoy and Bill Reynolds. Norman Smalley was also in attendance.

Norman Smalley appeared before the Council to discuss the possibilities of the City furnishing water to the area north and west of the City Limits. The Council stated that they did not have any idea of the cost that would be involved. Mayor Ryan told Norman that he would contact Mike Lemke to see if we could find a study made several years ago about the cost to provide water service to that area.

Pat Ryan reported on maintenance matters for Wendell Campbell. The sewer plant had to have repairs to a shaft, which have been made. Bryant & Bryant will be in town this week to begin curb and gutter repairs. KG&E will be here tomorrow to do the Christmas lights and decorations. Wendell will take a day of vacation Friday, December 1, 1995.

The expenditures were presented and approved.

Kay Grochowsky reported that the shut-off deadline for water had passed with no shut-offs necessary.

A survey regarding Neighborhood Watch was presented to be used in the Newsletter and Pat Ryan suggested that a deadline of January 2, 1996 be added.

The Council decided not to make any change in the long distance service presently used.

Each Council member was given a list of employees and board members that will be included in the Awards Banquet to be held in February. It was decided to add Mike Tanner, Gary George, Greg Nye, Levi Goossen, Pat Regier, Ron Hoffman, Jim Werries and Steve Anderson to the list.

A thank you note was received by the Council from Wheat State Manor for the coffeemaker that the Council donated to them.

A discussion was held regarding bonuses to the staff. After discussion, Robert Roth (Mike Slaymaker) moved that bonuses totaling \$625.00 be given, Wendell Campbell to receive \$250 and \$125 each to Kay Grochowsky, Kathy Wiebe and Jason Roth. Motion carried.

Larry Wiebe presented a request from the Butler County Extension Office for a donation from the City to support recycling programs. Discussion followed and Bill Reynolds suggested tabling this matter until the next meeting.

Because the fourth monday of December is Christmas Day, the council will meet Tuesday, December 26, 1995 at 7:30 p.m.

A motion was made and the meeting adjourned at 8:50 p.m.

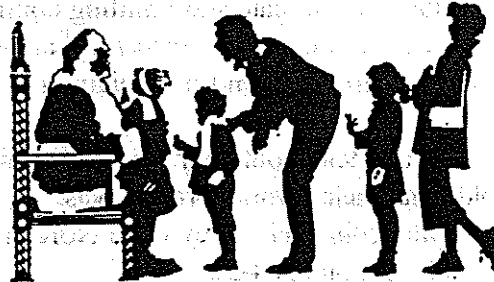


DURING DECEMBER:

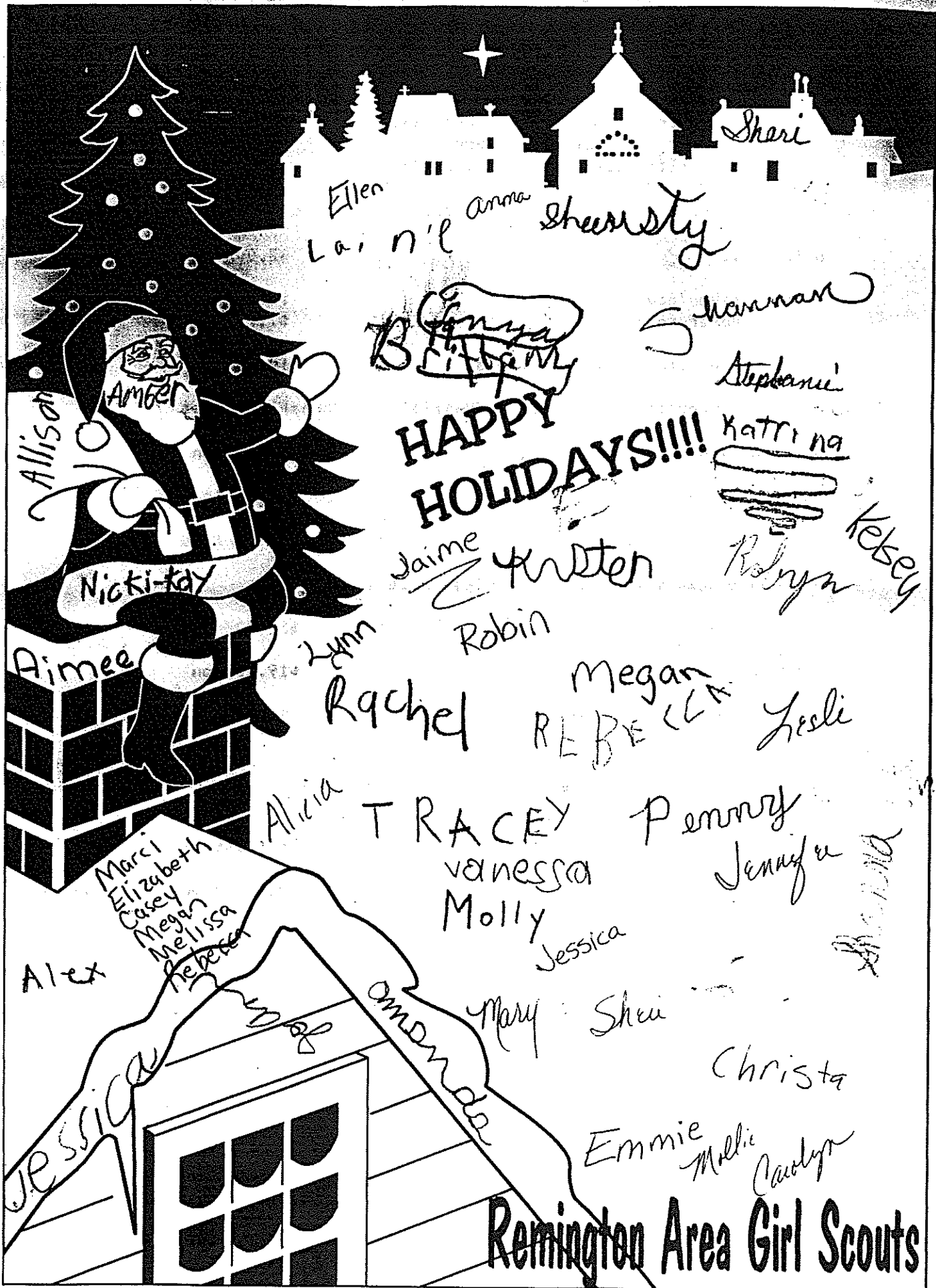
