Whitewater City Council Meeting November 10, 2003 - 7:00 p.m.

Members present were: Ted Graham, Dan Ravenscraft, Bill Reynolds and Patrick Ryan. Others present were: Kathy Wiebe, Dave Silbernagel, Dan March, Mark Annen, John Hirsch, April Wiebe, Bill Carey, and Mike Hill.

Mayor Patrick Ryan called the meeting to order at 7:02 p.m.

Dan March talked to the council about the possibility of having medical treatment available in the city of Whitewater, perhaps one day a week.

Bill Carey was present to talk to the council about his property located at 418 N. Locust. Mr. Carey will address some of the concerns expressed by the neighbors in that area.

Ordinance 531 regarding cross connections was presented to the council. Bill Reynolds (Ted

Graham) moved to pass Ordinance 531. Motion carried.

Bill Reynolds (Dan Ravenscraft) moved to adopt Ordinance 532. This Ordinance has to do with a yearly increase in the refuse rates. This increase of \$.25 a year over each of the next three years per customer from Stutzman's Refuse Service will just be passed on to the cities customers. Motion carried.

Mark Annen presented some of the areas of interest that the newly former Chamber of Commerce are interested in pursuing. Dan Ravenscraft (Ted Graham) moved that the city become a member of the Chamber of Commerce. Motion carried.

Bill Reynolds (Ted Graham) moved that the council enter into executive session for 15 minutes. Motion carried. Ted Graham (Bill Reynolds) moved to move out of executive session.

Motion carried.

No action was taken.

Bill Reynolds (Dan Ravenscraft) moved that the council enter into executive session for 10 minutes.

Motion carried.

Ted Graham (Dan Ravenscraft) moved to leave executive session.

Motion carried. Dan Ravenscraft (Bill Reynolds) moved to offer the City Superintendent's position to Dave Silbernagel beginning January 1, 2004. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried. Dave said that he would accept the position.

Dan Ravenscraft (Bill Reynolds) moved to enter executive session for 15 minutes to discuss personnel matters. Motion carried. (Bill Reynolds

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(Ted Graham) moved to end executive session. No action was taken in executive session. Bill Reynolds (Dan Ravenscraft) moved that the council authorize Dave Silbernagel to offer the Assistant Superintendent's position to Mike Hill. A roll call vote was taken, motion carried. Mr. Silbernagel offered the Assistant's position to Mr. Hill. Mr. Hill accepted. He will begin work on December 15, 2003.

Dave discussed maintenance issues with the council. Speed limit signs were also discussed.

Dan Ravenscraft (Bill Reynolds) moved to enter executive session for 10 minutes for personnel matters. Motion carried. (Bill Reynolds (Ted Graham) moved that executive session end. Motion carried. No action was taken while in session. An end of the year review was done for personnel. Raises and insurance benefits were discussed. Dan Ravenscraft (Bill Reynolds) moved that the insurance benefit be increased beginning January 1, 2004. Bill Reynolds (Ted Graham) moved that Christmas bonuses be given. Motion carried.

Ted Graham (Bill Reynolds) moved that a gift certificated be given to Wendell upon retirement. Motion carried.

Ted Graham (Bill Reynolds) moved that Larry Wiebe continue to serve on the Butler County Solid Waste Committee. Motion carried.

The November court docket was presented.

Bill Reynolds (Dan Ravenscraft) moved to accept the expenditures as presented. Motion carried.

Bill Reynolds reported on the sales tax committee that he is serving on.

A request from Tour Butler was presented. Bill Reynolds (Ted Graham) moved that we do the same contribution as in the past. Motion carried.

A thank you from Jean Thiessen was read. A thank you will be sent to her as well for her time as director of the Whitewater Memorial Library.

Ted Graham (Dan Ravenscraft) moved that the city employees be given the Friday following Christmas & New Year's off this year. Motion carried.

Bill Reynolds (Dan Ravenscraft) moved to adjourn at 9:30 p.m. Motion carried.

AMERICAN LEGION AUXILIARY

In 1953 the Whitewater American Legion, composed of WWI & WWII veterans, had completed a new Legion Building. There was indebtedness to pay but no money. Various ideas were discussed and it was decided to have a Ground Hog/Pancake/Feed on the Saturday nearest Ground Hog Day.

The Legionnaires butchered their own hog, ground their own meat and then had to peddle parts of the hog not used for sausage. This did not prove too satisfactory. The serving was from 4:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. A good portion of the commodities were donated. The attendance isn't known but an estimate was around 200.

In 1954 it was voted to have the Whitewater Locker do the slaughtering and meat packaging. The Whitewater Locker has done that now for 53 years.

The record high attendance was 993 in '01. This averages out to 90 people per hour. In 1998 between 11:00 & 11:30 120 people paid to eat.

This year, 2004, the feed starts at 8:00 a.m. and goes continuous to 7:00 p.m., same as past years. The charge will be \$5.00 for adults, \$3.00 for youth 7 to 12. Kids 6 and under are free.

One pound packages of frozen meat will be available for \$2.75 a package.

The money derived from the feed will help support the many programs of the American Legion and the cost of maintaining the Legion Building.

Workers will be composed of veterans from WWII, Korea, Vietnam, and Desert Storm.

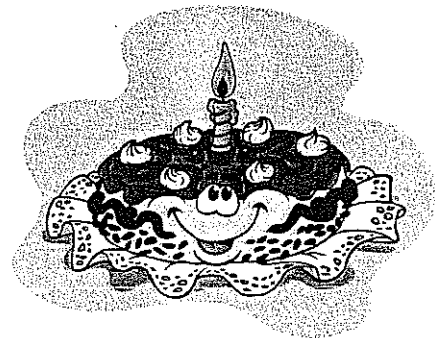

Dave Silbernagel has filled the position left vacant by Wendell's retirement. We want to wish Dave the best as he starts this new part of his job.

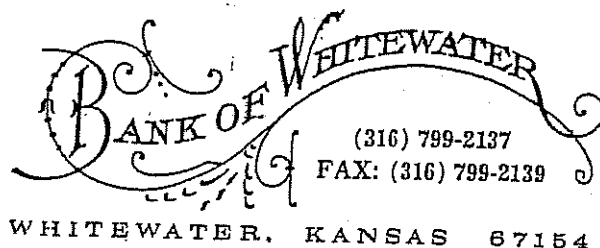
Michael Hill has been hired as assistant superintendent. We want to welcome Mike to his new job. Please make Mike feel welcome.

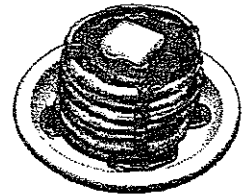

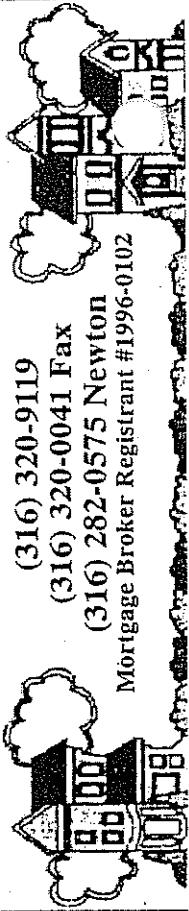

Mayor Patrick Ryan

called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

Dan Ravenscraft (Larry Wiebe) moved to approve the application of Whitewater Recreation for their Cereal Malt Beverage License.

Mr. Campbell asked about repairing the brakes on the dump truck. Gerald Unruh will be contacted about repairing these. Christmas lights for next year were discussed. These will be looked into.

The November animal control report was received.

The December court docket was received.

Ted Graham (Mike Brown) moved to accept the expenditures as presented. Motion carried.

The 20 mph speed limit in town was discussed. Further study is needed in regards to stop signs and speed limit signs.

Kay Grochowsky requested that fire district records be allowed to be transferred to a different computer, if necessary. The council agreed to this request.

Condemnation proceedings were discussed. The appraisers have met and the council should be receiving a report back before too long.

Cingular has been contacted about cellular service in town. They should be calling the office back to gather additional information.

Refinancing of the cities bonds was discussed. Gary George will be contacted to see if we should refinance our bonds due to the lower interest rates available.

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A representative from the Wichita Wranglers will attend the next council meeting to see about having a community night with the Wranglers.

Bill Reynolds (Dan Ravenscraft) moved to adjourn at 7:45 p.m. Motion carried.

January 12, 2004 - 7:00 p.m.

Mayor Patrick Ryan called the meeting to or-

der at 7:03 p.m. Willard Wiebe was present to talk to the council about the progress on the lagoon project. A copy of the timeline for the lagoon project was given to Mr. Wiebe. The Option to Purchase contract was discussed. Mr. Wiebe left the meeting.

Robert Slaughter was present to discuss scheduling a Whitewater Community Night with the Wichita Wranglers. The Council decided to schedule May 27 for a Whitewater Community Night. Tickets will be sold for \$4.00 a piece for general admission seating. Tickets will be sold at the City Building beginning the first part of April. The money raised will be used for Christmas lights for the downtown area. Mr. Slaughter left the meeting.

Dave Silbernagel informed the council that Swiss Church will be starting the parking project soon. Mr. Silbernagel also asked about purchasing new heaters for the well houses for next winter.

The court docket for January was received.

The council was informed that the vacancy left by Cynthia Lemke resignation from the Cemetery Board has been filled by Marilyn Slaymaker.

Various companies have been contacted about placing a cell phone tower in Whitewater. The city clerk will continue to work on this.

Charles Bouilly was contacted regarding the city bonds. Mr. Bouilly informed the council that refinancing would not be a benefit to the city due to the short time left on the bonds and the interest rate that they are already under.

Christmas lights for the downtown area were discussed. The poles will need to be rewired - Mike Slaymaker has agreed to help with this. Ornaments will be looked into further.

Ted Graham (Dan Ravenscraft) moved that the city clerk's office will be closed on January 19 - Martin Luther King day. Motion carried.

Dan Ravenscraft (Ted Graham) moved that a used typewriter be purchased for use at the city building. Motion carried.

A letter from Greg Nye was presented to the council. Action was postponed until February.

Dan Ravenscraft (Larry Wiebe) moved to adjourn at 8:38 p.m. Motion carried.

responded to 18 calls in January 2004. The breakdown of calls is as follows: 13 medical emergencies, 2 natural gas leaks, 1 grass fire, 1 truck fire, and 1 structure fire. Of these calls: 6 were in Whitewater, 4 were in Milton Township, 3 were in Richland Township and 5 were in Fairmount Township.

The January 7th drill was held in Whitewater. Scene safety and air pack training was provided. Crime scene preservation was also discussed.

The January 21st drill was held in Whitewater. Search and rescue scenarios were practiced. Full bunker gear and air packs were required.

We currently have 23 volunteers on the roster. This is the most we have had in a long time. Please take a minute to thank the volunteers if you see them. Many hours of personal time are put in to serve on the department.

Special thanks to Brian & Paula Johnson for allowing us to train in the apartment above the grocery store. This training allows us to work on a variety of training issues in a dry, protected area.

AMERICAN LEGION

The 2004 Ground Hog/Pancake Feed is now history. No records were set, except maybe the bitter cold. When the doors opened it was 1 degree and by mid afternoon it was 25 degrees. There was 4 inches of snow on the ground. The weather kept many away but 694 did show up to eat over one half pound per person and an estimated 4 pancakes a piece. The gain or loss is not known at the time of this writing.

Veterans of WWII, Korea, Vietnam, and Desert Storm did the cooking. and KP work. The Whitewater Boy Scouts helped in the dining room. No one had to wait over a few minutes to be served.

The Whitewater American Legion expresses their thanks to the city employees who did a magnificent job of clearing the streets and sidewalks in the Legion Building area and Main Street. People commented about this.

The Legion was prepared to serve 1,000 people, but the attendance was down one third, consequently there are a lot of 1# frozen packages of sausage available for \$2.75 a package. Automation Process Update: Slowly but Surely

- Perfect shelf list – 10,000 items – *more than half done*
- Select software vendor – narrowed to 2 – *to be finalized in April*
- Send perfected shelf list to vendor for conversion
- Order hardware
- Hardware and software installation
- Trial run and Grand Opening

It may look like nothing is being done or no progress is being made on automation, but that is the nature of this kind of project. After the initial, time-consuming steps are completed, the progress will become visible all at once.

FLOOD STUDY

The Federal Emergency Management Agency announced today, March 3, 2004, that under authority of the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (P. L. 90-448), as amended, and the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (P. L. 93-234), it will fund a study of the flood hazard areas in the City of Whitewater.

The study will be performed for the Federal Emergency Management Agency by the Kansas Department of Agriculture. The purpose of this study is to examine and evaluate the flood hazard areas in the community that are developed or are likely to be developed. The flood data will be used by the community to carry out the floodplain management objectives of the National Flood Insurance Program. They will also be used as the basis for determining the appropriate flood insurance premium rates for buildings and for their contents.

This announcement is intended to notify all interested persons of the commencement of this study so that they may have an opportunity to bring any relevant facts and technical data concerning local flood hazards to the attention of the Federal Emergency Management Agency for consideration in the course of this study. Such information should be furnished to the City Building in Whitewater, for forwarding to Kansas Department of Agriculture.

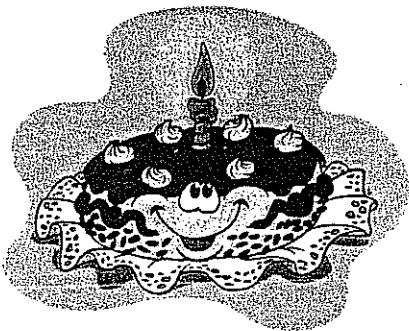
NORTH BUTLER 4-H NOTES

Q. How much should I take? How often?
A. The feedback from our customers and our own personal experience suggests:

- Allergies: a teaspoon in the morning and evening, more if needed.

are either dehydrated in pill or powder form or in a solution of sugar water or alcohol. Our customers tell us that the pill form does not work as well for them and most do not want the added sugar or alcohol. Because of the concentration of the entire elderberry, you get all the benefits of the berry instead of just some of them, like in an extract. If you do not like the taste of the concentrate, we suggest adding it to water, tea, juice, clear soda pop or adding your favorite sweetener, to make it more to your taste.

Q. How long will it last open?
A. Once opened, it should last just fine in the refrigerator for at least 90 days. Before opening, it will last indefinitely. (In determining that size to buy, perhaps knowing that each ounce is equal to either two tablespoons or six teaspoons would help. The Concentrate is available in both 5 ounce and 12-12 ounce sizes.)

Q. Is it safe for children?

Wheat State Manor Expands Outpatient Therapy Program with New Therapy Modality – E-stim/Ultrasound



Wheat State is happy to announce a new "modality" of therapy called E-stim/Ultrasound. This new means of providing therapeutic touch to muscle and joint problems is made possible with a \$2,300 allocation from memorial funds. This new therapy modality enables Wheat State to expand its outpatient physical and occupational therapy to the community.

The E-stim/Ultrasound is a two-in-one machine that our licensed therapists can use to relieve deep pain and to retrain muscles. E-stim uses tiny electrical currents applied to muscles through adhesive electrodes to electrically stimulate muscle function.

In the case of joint pain, after surgery for instance, the electrodes would be attached above and below the joint to apply weak pulses of electrical current. These electrical currents trick the pain receptors, taking away the normal pain of movement so that the joint can be exercised and the patient can begin to recover range of motion.

E-stim can be used for stroke patients to reeducate muscles. For example, a patient who has lost their control of their arm could receive e-stim applied to the "belly" or the middle of the long muscle in the arm. The waves of electrical current act to stimulate the muscle to contract artificially in order to retrain a muscle how to flex and move on its own.

Ultrasound, normally associated with obstetric imaging of fetuses, can be used to offer deep muscle relief. The ultrasonic sound waves that define images below the surface also can be directed at a muscle to stimulate the molecules causing movement and warmth which improves blood flow, which contributes to healing and relief.

Who can receive the healing touch of these new modalities? The residents of course have these services available to them through Medicare B when they get a doctor's order. People from the community can come for outpatient therapy, accessing the service just like a resident by getting a doctor's order for Med B OT or PT therapy.

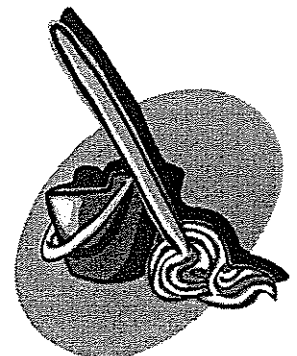

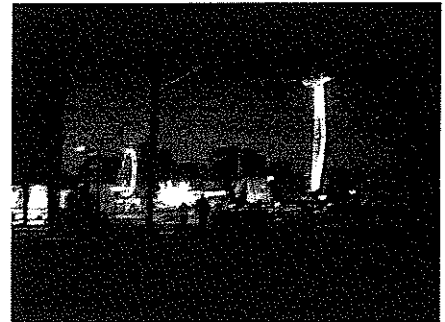
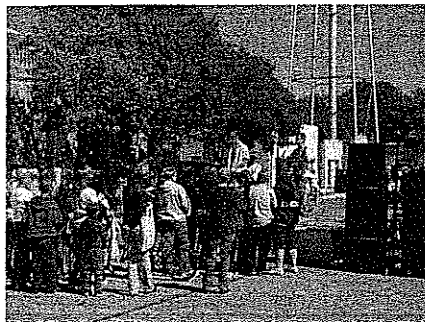
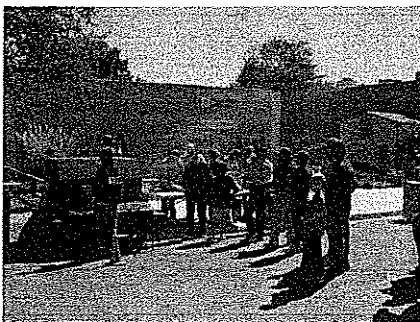


The normally quiet streets of downtown Whitewater came alive on Saturday, October 2, 2004 for the 9th Annual Whitewater Lions Club Fall Festival!

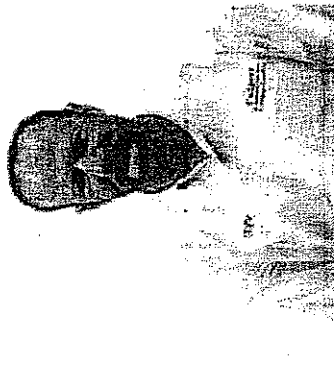

Rose Mary Saunders presented bills for

the lagoon project. The first was to Greg Nye for legal work. Ted Graham (Larry Wiebe) moved to accept this bill for payment. A bill for an environmental report was next presented. Mike Brown (Dan Ravenscraft) moved to accept this bill. The next was a bill for the initial engineering fee. Ted Graham (Larry Wiebe) moved to accept this bill. All motions carried.

Mike Brown (Ted Graham) moved to allow the lids for the risers to be purchased as proposed by Dave Silbernagel. Motion carried. Mr. Silbernagel also informed the council of a request to remove a sidewalk area at 224 S. Elm and then replace it, but would like to move it closer to the curb area. 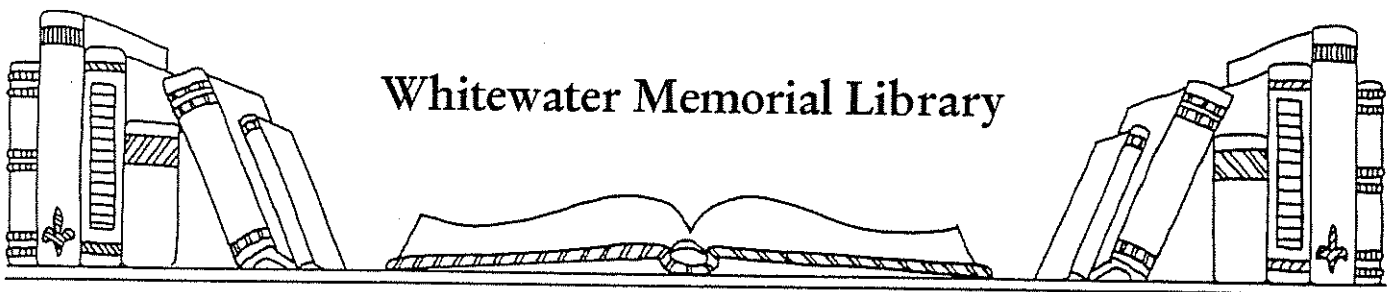

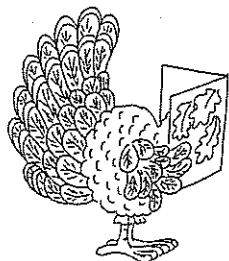
New Collection : Music Compact Discs

A lease agreement will be drawn up for the area outside of the fenced area at the lagoon.

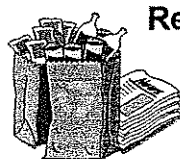
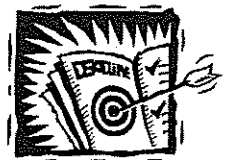
After some discussion it was decided that the city would no longer sell hunting licenses due to the expense involved in obtaining the new system of licensure.

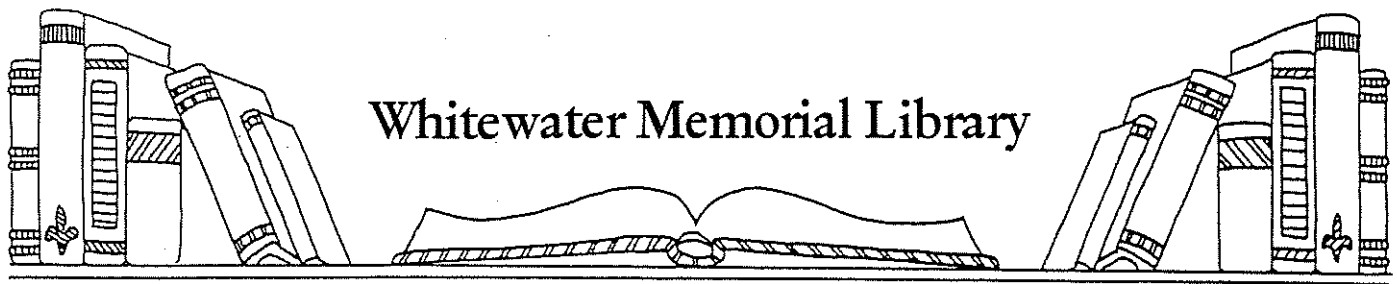

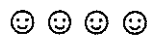
11,215 Reasons to Smile This Christmas

Mr. Larry Papenfuss, Automation Technology Coordinator for the South Central Kansas Library System (SCKLS), announced this week that Whitewater Memorial Library has received **full funding** of its 2004 SCKLS Annual Competitive Automation Matching Grant application for \$11,215.

Seven applications were scored by a five-member review team representing each SCKLS member constituent group of public, school, academic and special libraries, as well as SCKLS Director Paul Hawkins. "Awards were based on how well applications met the grant guidelines," according to Papenfuss.

The grant application, written by Friends Secretary Sylvia Epp and Library Director Jean Thiessen, received five scores, with the highest being a perfect score of 100 and the lowest being 81 points. The average of all five scores ranked Whitewater at the top and resulted in their qualification for full funding.

Grant funds will be used for technical support and hardware and software upgrades.

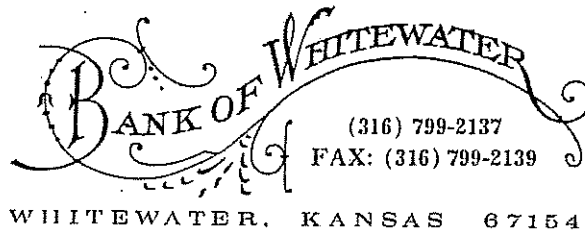

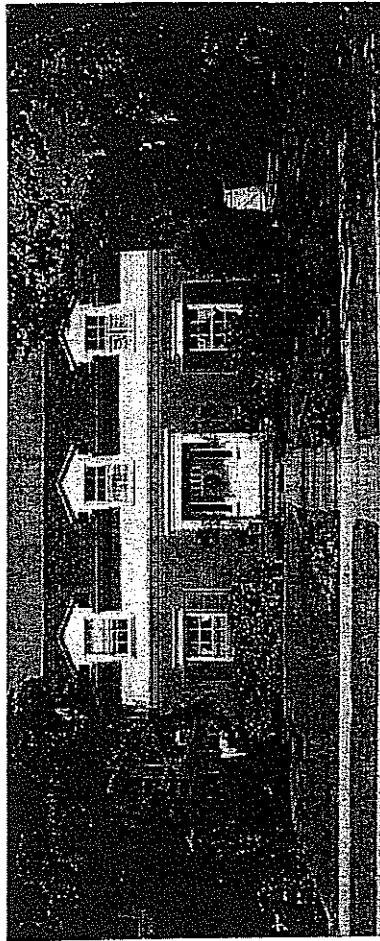
