City Council Meeting Highlights from 1/27/24

- The council has decided to table the topic of vacating the city alleyway located west of the house on 512 N. Main.
- The Financial Report provided by City Treasurer Ullum showed comparisons between the 2023 and 2024 years. The comparison helped reveal areas to watch as well as the fact that we are heading in the right direction and doing well.
- Parks & Rec provided a report through Andy Floyd to the council. Basketball has just a few more weeks and then the baseball programs will be starting. Thankful for the work City Maintenance has done on the outfields which will be in good condition when the seasons start. Parks & Rec continue to work on their social media game and are looking to get a website set up.
- Officer Moore reports four (4) traffic stops and one (1) warrant arrest.
- City Maintenance reports that after this snow and ice removal process it would be a good idea to budget for the purchase of a plow that can attach to the F-250. This will provide a more efficient removal process and create safer travel on our streets.
- The City Clerk continues to provide functional computers/laptops for the office work being done by both the treasurer and maintenance. All ordinances, resolutions and annexation ordinances have been scanned organized and sent on to Ranson Citycode. The hope is to have all our current codes online in a few months. Office hours changed to 8am-4pm.
- The Mayors report concerning information gathered for the position of and hiring an animal control officer was assisted with the presence of Dr. Pat Regier of Countryaid Vet. There were discussions of setting up a kennel out at the old water plant to assist in animal containment.

North Butler 4-H Club Now is the Best Time to Set Goals for the New 4-H Year

The North Butler 4-H Club held their regular monthly meeting January 20th at the Emmaus Church. Vice President Ella Amend led the meeting. Roll call was taken by members completing the statement, "My favorite chip is...": fourteen members were present.

Harley McLaughlin gave the 4-H Council Report and reminded members that 4-H Days is March 2nd. For a leader's report, Debora Claassen echoed the reminder of the upcoming 4-H Days event and that sign-up was open. She also encouraged everyone to read the newsletter that was sent out by the Extension office. Finally, Debora shared with the club that now was a great time to set goals for this year's 4-H project. Setting goals will give a place to start, and a spot to reach for throughout the year.

Three birthdays were recognized: Milo, Hadley, and Natalie. For this month's program, Kate led the club in singing "Row, Row, Row Your Boat." She could not join in person, so she did this virtually by playing the piano and sending a video for us to sing along to! Rustin gave a project talk on "Making Jewelry," and showcased bracelets and earrings she has made from clay beads. Lucy told us about the trip she took to Thailand and Myanmar! Ella demonstrated "How to Make Cookie Dough Overnight Oats." Kierra shared her violin talent by engaging the audience with three Christmas songs. As she played, she didn't tell us the names, but we could join in if we recognized them! It was a lot of fun. The songs were: "Angels We Have Heard On High," "I Saw Three Ships," and "O Come All Ye Faithful."

After the program, Milo led us in playing Color Tag, and refreshments were served by the Miller family.





PRACTICING KINDNESS IMPROVES HEALTH

The phrase, "Be kind," is one many of us have heard since we were toddlers. Most people understand what it means to be kind, whether they practice it authentically is a choice. Research now suggests that making kindness a habit impacts health and longevity. Take a look for yourself at how being kind plays a more significant role in boosting happiness, psychological well-being, and physical health than you may have realized.

Being kind changes the brain – Those who practice kindness through volunteering don't experience the same type of declines in memory or executive functioning compared to those who do not volunteer. Research results have shown that after two year of regular volunteer work people's brain health was significantly impacted.

Those who practice kindness regularly have lower risks of mortality – People who are kind have been shown to be more physically active. They are able to walk longer at older ages, have better balance, and have lower levels of physical pain. Researcher still do not understand the exact mechanisms by which acts of kindness improve people's health, but it is likely that multiple processes are at play.

Kindness reduces stress - Stress causes a cascade of reactions in your body. It can drive up blood pressure, ultimately lead to higher cholesterol levels, and other changes that raise the risk of cardiovascular disease and other poor health outcomes. Kindness may help buffer that stress response by distracting you from problems you may be having, so that you are less reactive to yourself and have a clearer perspective.

Acts of kindness reduce social isolation – Social isolation is a known risk factor for physical and mental health problems. Acts of kindness require going out to help others and looking outside of our own circumstances. This sense of purpose and connection reduces the impact of isolation.

Kindness impacts the health of all ages – In a recent study, high school students were randomly assigned to volunteer for 10 weeks with elementary school kids. Compared to students in the trial who were put on a wait list, the teen volunteers had improvements in several markers of cardiovascular health: healthier body mass index, healthier inflammatory markers, and healthier total cholesterol. The students who increased the most in empathy and altruistic behaviors, and who decreased the most in negative mood, also showed the greatest decreases in cardiovascular risk over time.

Acts of kindness are actions of the heart. Now research backs that these heartfelt actions have heart healthy results. Make the choice to "Be kind," and feel the ways a kind heart can create a healthier heart.



Petroglyphs of the Kansas Smoky Hills



Too often Kansas history seems to start with the Coronados' trip through the state in 1541. For centuries before European

arrival, Native people lived on the plains, and some left behind rock carvings on soft sandstone in the middle of the state. Based on the book Petroglyphs of the Kansas Smoky Hills, this presentation focuses on these carvings, the people who made them, and what the carvings tell us about those people and their relationship to the land. The presentation also discusses the challenges of dating and interpreting these carvings, the threats posed by erosion and vandalism, and the role of landowners whose property shelters these carvings. Rex is the former director of the Kansas Geological Survey and the author of books about Kansas geology and water. "Petroglyphs of the Kansas Smoky Hills" is part of Humanities Kansas's Speakers Bureau, featuring humanitiesbased presentations designed to share stories that inspire, spark conversations that inform, and generate insights that strengthen civic engagement. Members of the community are invited to attend the free program. The program is made possible by Humanities Kansas and the Frederic Remington Area Historical Society.

PET REGISTRATION IS REQUIRED IN WHITEWATER

WHITEWATER CITY CODES, CHAPTER II: ANIMAL CONTROL & REGULATION

Every owner of any dog or cat over three months of age shall **ANNUALLY** register with the city clerk his or her name and address with the name, sex and description of each dog and cat owned and kept within the city. It shall be unlawful for the owner of any newly acquired dog or cat which is brought into the city to fail to register such animal within 30 days from acquisition or bringing the dog or cat into the city. It shall be unlawful for the owner of any previously registered dog or cat to fail to maintain current registration of such animal.


TAGS & COLLARS

Once registered the city clerk will provide to the owner or keeper of the dog/cat a tag with the registration number and the registration year/color thereon, which shall be, by the owner or keeper, <u>attached to the collar</u> to be used on the dog/cat so registered.

To receive a tag one must supply the city with: 1.) Registration Form 2.) Proof of Rabies Vaccine 3.) Payment 4.) Photo of Animal TAG COSTS: Spayed/Neutered = \$5 NOT spayed/neutered = \$10
